As we look forward to what the Lord has in store for Killian Pines United Methodist Church in 2021, it's also important for us to pause and reflect on our mission and outreach during 2020. 2020 has indeed changed us all, but more importantly, we have found ways to make this year a little less lonely for others and for us to feel less isolated. Who would have imagined that our mission of Reaching Out, Growing, and Serving in Christ would have taken on such new significance? Here are highlights of our outreach through our love, our service, our gifts, our prayers, and our witness.

We ushered in 2020 fully committed to our mission of outreach. Within the first two months of the year, we distributed care packages and footwear to the homeless and ministered to them through our Soles for Souls Project. We also enhanced our outreach through the Annual Chili Cookoff, the Ash Wednesday Pancake **Supper**, and the **workshop** at our church which featured a South African Pastor.

In mid-March, due to COVID-19, KPUMC suspended all in-sanctuary worship. However, with this challenge came new ways to witness, worship, and serve. It was the pandemic that led to the creation of our "Circles of Care" an effective and efficient way of intentionally reaching out and caring for others. Similarly, the drive-by concept became a new way for safe outreach and recognition. In June, when we said goodbye to Pastor Michelle and welcomed Pastor Wilma, we "honked and waved." Members' birthdays and anniversary celebrations, as well as the distribution of the Upper Room devotional, our communion elements, and our statements of stewardship, were safely and appropriately executed by drive-by. Zoom worship and Zoom meetings also became an innovative and integral part of our lives and allowed us to feel connected while safely participating from our homes. During 2020, KPUMC continued to be generous with its gifts. We honored our pastors, showed love to our pastoral student at Emory, supported the Florida United Methodist Children's Home, contributed to the Bernice Reed Memorial Fund, and sent cards, flowers, and gifts to uplift members. We also continued the tradition of our Holiday Teddy Bear Collection for the Miami-Dade Police Department for distribution to needy children and donated personal essentials for our ongoing Homeless Ministry.

Throughout the year, weekly

meetings and daily prayers nurtured healing, wholeness, and hope. Our weekly Sunday **School** during the first few months of the year also fostered a pathway to spiritual growth. The Morning Musings Podcast and weekly Bible Study inspired, strengthened faith, and biblical understanding. Election Day Prayer Stations allowed voters to read scriptures, reflect, and pray as they prepared to vote. Consistently, KPUMC has made every effort to communicate and reach out by newsletter. Whether it was "Rooted in Faith, Hope, and Love" or "Streaming Light" or the "Pine Cone," these publications, kept us all engaged and informed.

As we say goodbye to 2020 and, as you reflect on your personal outreach, we thank you for your contribution to our mission. If you were unable to join us by Zoom, or to participate in any of our ministries, we thank you for the silent prayer you offered or the phone call or text you made to support and cheer up a friend or loved one. Remember, God wants our lives to overflow with mercy, love, and compassion so we can hear Him say, "Whatever you do for the least of these, you do for me." Matthew 25:40. May 2021 be one of increased sensitivity, outreach, service, healing, and hope.
